RAISING THE BAR

THE ROSE GARDEN

They say beauty is in the eve of the beholder, but virtually everyone can agree that downtown Phoenix's newest cocktail bar, The Rose Garden, holds that quality in spades. Indeed, beauty is at the heart of both its menu (think a pastel rainbow of botanically inspired sips) and its design. Located in the landmark U.S. Bank Center, The Rose Garden celebrates sumptuousness with moss green walls, banquette seating, brass accents and just the right amount of wood grain. A sapphire-hued peacock floats above the main dining room, its presence nodding to the origin story behind the design concept in which a peacock and rose garden compete for

admiration. The well-executed details are no surprise considering the developers behind The Rose Garden are Chiara Katz, Josh Katz and Moe Murillo, the same trio who created Sip Coffee and Beer as well as 36 Below. "We wanted to do something elevated and sophisticated," Chiara explains. "The downtown market is becoming a destination for nightly entertainment, and we wanted to be a part of it." In addition to cocktails and tapas, The Rose Garden offers 2,000 square feet of interior space, a newly opened patio with about 40 seats and, due to open in 2023, a private room for up to 25 quests.



INTERIOR DEFINE STUDIO

Good things come to those who wait. And in the case of design aficionados in Scottsdale, the good thing is Interior Define, a customizable furniture studio that recently moved from a pop-up location to a permanent storefront at Kierland Commons. Interior Define will be familiar to some of Arizona's more recent transplants from California and Washington, although its new Scottsdale digs may feel refreshingly different. The 6,758-square-foot showroom resides at a welltrafficked intersection of the shopping center. Inside, it looks like a well-appointed home—albeit one that happens to be occupied by a team of design experts wielding cutting-edge technology. Stroll through the studio to browse 80% of the brand's current product offerings, a dedicated work space for design consultations, and more than 125 fabrics, rug swatches, cushion fills, leg options and other features that have made Interior Define a go-to vendor for customizable furnishings. interiordefine.com

Sometimes it takes extraordinary circumstances to find your destiny. Such was the case for Aileen Martinez, who began sketching local coffee shops and Phoenix landmarks when pandemic lockdowns closed the school where she worked. Martinez, an art school graduate, found her calling while drawing. Using watercolors and a blend of instinct and training, each of her illustrations riff on reality, whether she's depicting ASU Gammage or a personal residence. Martinez now draws full time, taking on several commissions a week and running an online shop with prints and postcards. Here, she reflects on her most unusual project, why people are drawn to her art and what she'd like to do next. lookseedraw.com

Why do people want illustrations of local landmarks? Someone remarked that they always see Paris romanticized and landmarks in other cities, but never in Phoenix. People have attachments to these

places, though, and it's gratifying to be able to say, "Oh, it's my city being illustrated."

What has been your most surprising commission to date? Gila River Arena asked me to draw Black Dog Forge in Seattle, where Pearl Jam got their start, with the intention of gifting the illustration to the band. It was cool that something I made was given to them while they were on tour in Phoenix.

Why do you think your art resonates so strongly with people? Anyone can relate to it, regardless of their belief system, background or political views. It's a neutral space. And I think it comes down to memories and nostalgia; emotions attached to places.

What's next for you? I like drawing and watercolors so much because you can finish faster. Painting takes longer, but I'd like to get into it. I want to make something bigger and challenge myself in that way.
